Military: Stewart enlisted in the U.S. Navy on 16 December 1955. At the time of his death, he was serving as an Aviation Fire Control Technician Second Class (AT2) with Heavy Attack Squadron 2, flying A3D Skywarriors out of Whidbey Island, Washington. During a training flight, his aircraft suffered an unexplained explosion that caused the tail section to separate from the fuselage. The aircraft crashed approximately seven miles south of Harrington, Washington, killing two of the three crew members on board.

Civilian: Stewart was a graduate of Denton High and attended NTSC. He worked at the Perryman-Williams Drug Store before joining the Navy.

Family: Stewart's father, Stewart Sr., and a sister, Jackie, predeceased him. He was survived by his mother, (Alma) Lorene Jackson and a brother, John Melvin Harpole.
