Civilian: Mr. Guthrie was very active in his community and church. "By the last quarter of the nineteenth-century, a rapid increase in population, as well as change in building and technology, for example the lighting and heating of interior space, led the Chinn's Chapel congregation to plan for a more adequate house of worship. In 1877, the Church's trustees purchased the four-acre campground site in the alley, and there they erected a new building much different from the old log cabin on the hill. Those trustees who undertook the building of the new chapel were: Martin Guthrie, A. McLean, Ezekiel Rowell, J.R. Lester, and L.N. Carter. Now the Methodists were seated on backless benches surrounding a warming pot-bellied stove in winter and were cooled in summer by cross ventilation from eight glassed windows which could be lifted and closed."
